Our Principles and Sources as UUs

We affirm and promote:

- 1. The inherent worth and dignity of every person;
- 2. Justice, equity and compassion in human relations;
- 3. Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;
- 4. A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;
- 5. The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;
- 6. The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- 7. Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part;
- 8. Journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions.

The living traditions we share draw from many sources:

- 1. Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life;
- 2. Words and deeds of prophetic people which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- 3. Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- 4. Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves;
- 5. Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit;
- 6. Spiritual teachings of Earth-centered traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.

Our Symbols and History

Land Acknowledgement

2U resides on the traditional homelands of the Three Fires Confederacy: Ojibwe, Odawa, and Potawatomi. This region has long been a center for Indigenous people to gather, trade, and maintain kinship ties. Today, one of the largest urban American Indian communities in the United States resides in Chicago.

Our Logo



We incorporate two powerful symbols into our identity: the flaming chalice emblem of Unitarian Universalism and the historic anvil once owned by our founding minister, Rev. Robert Collyer.

Rev. Collyer's journey from a humble blacksmith's apprentice in Yorkshire, England, to his pivotal role in our congregation is a testament to the rich tapestry of our history. In an era where most Unitarian preachers

hailed from privileged backgrounds, Rev. Collyer's working-class roots resonated deeply with our early members. This connection led them to acquire his cherished Yorkshire anvil, a poignant relic that endured the ravages of the Chicago fire, symbolizing resilience, and continuity.

During WWII, the Unitarian Service Committee adopted the flaming chalice as a beacon of hope and solidarity for those fleeing persecution. This symbol transcends religious boundaries, embodying the spirit of sharing and universal love. Its flame symbolizes not only power but also the resilience necessary to withstand adversity, offering solace in times of turmoil and strife.

Seymour Fleishman's original logo, updated by Ellen Rockett, captures the essence of our values. The chalice adorning our chancel was crafted by Libby Harvey-Hill. Lew Harding's skillful construction of the wood pedestal and anvil cabinet completes this tribute, showcasing the talents and dedication of our community.
